The Competition Act, 2002 replaced the Monopolies and Restrictive Trade Practices Act, 1969, as the same had become obsolete on account of international economic developments relating more particularly to competition laws and a need was felt to focus on competition. The Central Government to serve this need set up a High Level Committee on Competition Policy and Law to study the competition regime in the nation and prepare a report recommending modifications to the MRTP Act.

For 40 years, India had its own version of competition law, which was enacted through a legislation called the Monopolies and Restrictive Trade Practices Act 1969 (MRTP Act).
